Note 1: The contents of this vault were removed to Evergreen Cemetery after it opened in 1855. Several abandoned markers are scattered in the vicinity. The vault once was the resting place of Temperance “Tempe” Wick and her husband William Tuttle.

Note 2: A redstone fragment and a substructure are apparent between the graves of John Jacob Faesch, Jr. & his sister Eliza Faesch. The numbering plan used by Parker would indicate she did not believe there was a grave there.

Note 3: Identification is based on the numbering sequence of Parker’s Survey.

Note 4: Unidentified markers are located at sites 2, 5, & 8. All of those thought to be interred in this segment based on earlier Surveys were located.
