THE WEARY WORLD REJOICES

DEAR PCM FAMILY,

As the season of Advent begins, Christians turn toward the celebration of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem. This year, our Advent theme is **The Weary World Rejoices**. It comes from a line in the beloved song O Holy Night. For a weary world weighed down by fear and anxiety and violence and sin, Christ's birth signaled a time for rejoicing.

But what does that mean for the weary world, now?

For biblical scholars, it means the finale of an ancient prophetic expectation of a Messiah. For theologians, it means the Incarnation of God – the very Creator of all that is, taking human form. For mystics, it means the Word becoming flesh and dwelling among us. For people living in places of oppression, it means daring to strive for peace. For children, this season means sensing the wonder of a time when dark nights are lit, songs are sung, and joy is in the air.

For Starbucks, it means pouring their coffee into holiday-themed cups. For retailers, it means seasonal workers and a crush of shoppers. For our town, it means hauling out the annual decorations and fixing them to the trees and light poles around the Green.

For PCM, it means Christmas Eve worship (10:00 am, 4:00 pm, and 8:00 pm) and the rehearsals of handbells and choirs to prepare for it. It means readying the Church on the Green to welcome guests to our services and community events, including this year's Concert of Readings and Carols on December 9. It means Carols and Cocoa on the lawn of the Parish House on December 17 and our Longest Night Service in the Chapel on December 21. It means Operation Love and the Gift Bag Program for inmates at the Morris County Correctional Facility.

But what does is mean, to you, that the weary world rejoices?

That's a question I've been asking myself as we prepare for this Advent season. I think the answer lies in the words just before and after... about the thrill of hope heralded by Christ's arrival... for yonder breaks a new and glorious morn. No matter our perspective on this time of year, for "people walking in darkness," our hope for the coming Christ child carries us forward. We move into the night, trusting the dawn will come, and with it, a new day. There is no better time than Advent and Christmas to remember that in the midst of the weariness of the world, there is always cause to rejoice.

See you in church - and invite someone to join you!

As we name and validate those emotions for ourselves, we invite you to find community with like-minded people.

The Longest Night service is inclusive and open to everyone. It serves as a reminder that, even in the midst of holiday festivities, there is a space for acknowledging and honoring the diversity of our feelings this season.

If you or someone you know may benefit from this service, please consider attending or inviting others to our Longest Night service. All are welcome as we navigate this season together.

MEDITATION:

The season of giving is upon us, there is conflict in the world, and the needs in our communities near and far are significant. What has been our effort in loving all, and how have we used our gifts to serve the Lord? Consider each day what enriches you spiritually and draws you closer to experiences demonstrating our love and caring for each other. Within our homes and for all those we engage daily, give thanks for the journey is joyful, challenging, and often consumed with periods of loneliness and sadness.

Supporting each other is not something seasonal but a way of life. Share your gifts generously, as it is part of our Christian duty. Our PCM faith community is built on a foundation of serving all. Bring your gifts to share as the needs are plenty, and our community is strong with us all banding together for ALL!

PRAYER:

God of us all, we are so grateful that you call us to be a community. ACTIVITY:

As we care for each other, create a different kind of advent calendar this year. Instead of the chocolate ones you find at the store, write down on small pieces of paper tasks you could do throughout the Advent season and place them in a jar. Do it with a friend or family member, and take turns picking a task for the day. Name things such as: Compliment someone, make a handmade card for a friend, help with a household chore, leave a positive note for a colleague, smile and say hello to a stranger, bake cookies for a neighbor.

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Robin Ballard | Mark 1:1-8

MEDITATION:

The sacrament of baptism is how we are marked as God's own. John the Baptist acted in fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah by baptizing individuals after they confessed their sins, all while understanding that Jesus was going to be the one to baptize with the Holy Spirit.

As Christians, we all have been baptized and claimed as God's children. We are united with brothers and sisters all over the world who share our beliefs. We have been given the gift of knowing that in our baptisms, we were cleansed of our sins, and there is no sin so great that our Heavenly Father would not forgive us. Let us rejoice in knowing we are saved through the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

PRAYER:

God, thank you for marking us as your children. Help us to be worthy of your grace and to remember the sacrifices made for our salvation.

Amen.

ACTIVITY:

Gather some symbols of your baptism. Light a candle, grab a bowl of water, and find an object which represents when you were baptized. Sit with these objects as you repeat the prayer to yourself. Dip your hand in the water and feel its coolness as you remember that you are marked as God's own this season of Advent.

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Bill SanFilippo | Isaiah 61:1-4

MEDITATION:

Ever since my first job, I always feared making a mistake. I feared getting written up, spoken to, or even fired from the job. When you find yourself a job that matches your passion for helping others and giving back, you tend to give it your all.

One of my first experiences with this was not necessarily a direct impact on me but on those who I led and who trusted me to carry out our community work. During Covid, we were forced to let go of some of our best staff; the staff that used their time, talent, and treasures to carry out the much-needed work in our local communities. They were angry and upset, and they asked God, "Why me?"

Recently, I was reminded again of why we look to Jesus for all these things in our lives, as mentioned in Isaiah's scripture. One of our best employees, who worked 10-14 hour days, missed her kids' sporting events, family time, and time with God, made a mistake, and was let go within hours. Needless to say, she was devastated and hurt.

We learn that God's anointed is sent to the oppressed, to the ones whose hearts are crushed, to the captives, the imprisoned, and to all who mourn. Though unstated, in order to reach those persons, God's anointed must, of necessity, confront the perpetrators and sources of oppression, marginalization, hopelessness, and despair.

In this time of hurt, pain, and reflection, we think of how we are here to help all of God's people. Many of us wrapped our arms around her to make her feel comfort and love. It helped her heal and move on. Through prayer and hard work, she has landed a new job, just weeks later, which allows her to spend more time with family and work fewer hours for the same salary. Good news was delivered to those mourning and seeking hope.

This reminds us that no matter what happens, God has a plan for you and all. In this weary world, there is always hope and things to bring us joy when we trust God.

PRAYER:

Loving God over all creation, many of Your people are mourning today because of abuse and affliction, disease and death, unjust punishments, and evil persecutions. Comfort all who mourn and make us instruments of Your peace. Lord Jesus, come again quickly and make all things right in Your sight.

Amen.

ACTIVITY:

Be a good steward of God this week! Identify someone you know who is struggling, hurting from a mistake they made, or mourning for whatever reason. Reach out to them via call, text, zoom, and letter, and let them know they are part of God's plan and you are here to pray and support them.

FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS EVE

Elizabeth Annis | Luke 2:1-14

MEDITATION:

I was born in the New York Presbyterian Hospital and raised on the banks of the Hudson River just west of the city in a New Jersey town aptly named West New York. Throughout my life, I lived in the ever-present shadow of New York City. After college, I pursued my dream of attending art school and enrolled at Pratt Institute in Brooklyn. My first job after grad school led me to a small film distributor in the West Village. For the next 13 years, New York City became the epicenter of my world, encompassing my work, leisure, culture, entertainment, friendships, and romances. So, when, after only a year of marriage and just a few months after purchasing a home in Morristown, the devastating events of 9/11 unfolded, I was very affected. It was deeply personal. Everything had changed suddenly and drastically.

In the following weeks, months, and years, I witnessed the incredible power of God to heal all forms of suffering and renew the human spirit. Downtown New York was rebuilt and offered hope and promise. The stories, the memorials, new construction, the sheer wonder of it all—these were testaments to the power of the human spirit. To me, this is the essence of the story of the birth of Jesus Christ.

"Today in the town of David, a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger.' Suddenly, a great company of heavenly beings appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." Luke 2:11-14

Out of the darkness and despair of those days, a new life began in Morristown. A year later, I became a mother. As New York City rebuilt and regenerated, welcoming new life, our family found its roots in Morristown, and our faith in God continued to grow.

PRAYER:

Dear Heavenly God,

Give me the strength and wisdom to provide a warm, loving and stable home for me today and every day, and the ability to adequately serve as your eyes, ears and voice to continually provide hope, joy, laughter and love for a weary world that needs to be reminded that your presence is a constant source of comfort and guidance, even in the darkest of moments. I pray in Jesus' name, trusting in your unwavering love and grace.

Amen.

ACTIVITY:

Find one person this week to pray for who needs God's peace. Surprise an old friend you haven't spoken to in over ten years with a phone call.

CHRISTMAS DAY

Craig Barth | John 1:1-14

MEDITATION:

Wait a minute! This is a Christmas Day story? Where's "O little town of Bethlehem?" The narrative attributed to John is not a story of where and how but more of why and how come. Each narrative is equally meaningful. I live with these different narratives, not an "either-or/right-wrong" contrast but a "yes-and."

How we are so trained to see the world in "either-or" contrasts! When I was a rambunctious boy, I remember that the words go out and play often meant cowboys and Indians with cap guns! How repugnant that now feels. Though sadly, it continues to this day. All one needs to do is turn on the T.V. or your laptop, and you know in an instant who are spun to be the "good" guys and who spun to be the "bad" guys. Our view of the hurting world is filled with such dichotomies. It is simpler to picture, though not always compassionate.

Our God is a God full of "yes-ands." Even in this John narrative, the writer says, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overtake it." It does not say that the light overtook or obliterated the darkness either. It is not a static picture but a dynamic process. The One True Light shines in the midst of the darkness. Kathleen Thomerson's Hymn "I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light" describes this dynamic tension in the line "The day and the night are both alike." Another example of "yes-and."

Our God narrative is not only replete with yes-ands but with surprises as well. Think of the entire Christ birth story: a common, everyday couple placed in a refugee situation, giving birth in a faraway land for them, then having to flee shortly after he was born. Full of surprises!

The Rabbi was not trained in ecclesiastical ways of the established religion but in the trade of carpentry. Full of surprises!

PRAYER:

Gracious loving God, may we not view this world with either/or eyes but with yes/and hearts. As we consume ourselves with Advent and Christmas season, may we be aware of all the little surprises in our comings and goings. May we always remember that you are the Big Surprise for our hurting hearts and a weary world.

Amen.

ACTIVITY:

Surprise someone with an act of kindness and thoughtfulness. If you know someone who likes apple pie, make or get a pie, ring their doorbell and run! Make your surprise a family affair by cutting out a snowflake, glittering it, and mailing it to somebody (return address optional).

- Conditioner (neutral scents, no pumps)
- Lotion (neutral scents, no pumps)
- Deodorant (unscented or neutral scents)
- Bars of Soap (neutral scents, individually wrapped)

STEPHEN MINISTERS: MAKING A DIFFERENCE DURING A DIFFICULT TIME

You see us in the Narthex every Sunday, each with a small blue name tag that proclaims us to be a **Stephen Minister** or **Stephen Leader**. But what does that mean, and what is our purpose?

It means we are part of our church's **Stephen Ministry**, a team of congregation members trained to provide high-quality, one-on-one, Christ-centered care to people in the congregation and the community who are experiencing life difficulties. All of us have been trained by our Stephen Leaders, Stephen Ministers from our church who have been equipped for this key role through a special training course offered by Stephen Ministries St. Louis.

A Stephen Minister typically has one **Care Receiver** at a time, and meets with that person once a week for about an hour. The caring relationship lasts as long as the need persists.

Stephen Ministers are drawn to this ministry by their desire to make a difference during a time of great need in someone's life. Many of us have been surprised and gratified by the personal and spiritual growth we ourselves have experienced while working with our Care Receiver.

The Stephen Minister/Care Receiver relationship is characterized by complete confidentiality; even other Stephen Ministers do not know the identity of our Care Receiver. And what, exactly, do Stephen Ministers do for Care Receivers? First and foremost, we listen, and go from there. If you don't think that sounds like much, think again. I think it's safe to say everyone has been in situations when, however hard we tried, we felt we just weren't being heard. We all know how frustrating that is. Stephen Ministers are trained to be active, involved, and patient listeners.

Mission-focused actions that are central to Stephen Ministry include equipping people to use their gifts in ministry; helping people grow in their faith; providing care and support for hurting people; building up our congregation as a caring community; and reaching out with the love of Jesus Christ.
