# **LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOR**

### DEAR PCM FAMILY,

Back in March, I had the privilege of attending an event sponsored by the Presbyterian Foundation. A couple times each year, the Foundation brings together thirty pastors for three days of learning and collaborating across a variety of topics that the cohorts choose in advance topics that are relevant to the work of ministry. When I met with my cohort, one of the topics that got the most traction and had the liveliest discussion was about leading churches through the upcoming election cycle.

Well... here we are... the election cycle is now in full swing. And so, what should we, as a church, say about it? If we say nothing, we are surely out of step with the world beyond our walls. People are talking about politics in their everyday life; and if they're not discussing it openly with friends and family, they're certainly giving it a lot of personal thought. Shouldn't the church have something to say about things that are on the hearts and minds of parishioners?

But, if we do address matters of politics and the issues that people are already thinking about - we also run the risk of saying things that some might disagree with or that others may view as too controversial for church. The Rev. William J. Barber once said, "Preachers don't get to stay out of politics. We are either chaplains of empire or prophets of God." I think about that statement a lot.

In our group discernment, my little cohort of pastors at the Presbyterian Foundation event had mixed wisdom, reflecting the various options above. All of us agreed with Rev. Barber's assertion that we preachers don't get to stay out of politics. But how do we do so prophetically, faithfully, and pastorally?

What I keep coming back to is the wisdom of Jesus, who commanded us to love our enemies and to pray for those who persecute us. That's easier said than done, of course. It also just so happens that many of us (fortunately) don't have powerful enemies in the same way he did. But most of us do have neighbors... and Jesus also commanded us to love them.

And so, this autumn - this election cycle - we're going to be talking a lot about loving our neighbors. How do we love the neighbor who goes door-knocking for the candidates we don't like? How do we love the neighbor who advocates for policies we disagree with? How do we love the neighbor whose opinions we find downright offensive? How do we love our neighbors and not turn them into our enemies?

Maybe, "love your neighbor" is a political statement after all.

### CHRISTIANITY IN AMERICA | SEPTEMBER 15 - OCTOBER 6 | CHAPEL AND ONLINE

A historical review of Christianity in America from its formation arising from the English Reformation of the 17th century to the fragmentation of the religious choice of today. The objective of our time together is to examine what we believe today in the context of our national past.

#### SEPTEMBER 15

The English Reformation formed the architecture of Protestantism as it migrated from Western Europe to the English colonies. The Mainline Protestant Denominations that we know today were the product of this time and place.

#### **SEPTEMBER 22**

The American colonies were essentially English, German, and Dutch in nationality and Protestant in religion. We will review how the colonial experience and the American Revolution shaped the formation of Protestant faith into its own unique American character.

#### SEPTEMBER 29

Following the American Revolution and through the Civil War, Christianity in America continued to be publicly and expressly Protestant. But we begin to see significant diversity in Protestant beliefs and a growing representation of the Catholic faith.

#### OCTOBER 6

The influence of scientific thinking and expanding secular orientation began to polarize Christian beliefs in the 20th century, creating a broad spectrum of thought and practice from agnosticism to religious fundamentalism. Mainline denominations are a small fraction of what they were during the Revolutionary War period.

# **EMPATHY IN THE DIGITAL AGE**

Recently, we attended a Youth Ministry Design Workshop, hosted by the Presbytery of the Highlands. We spent time with other local pastors and youth leaders discussing some of the issues youth all over the country are facing today, and how a church community can be a part of a solution. Over and over, we heard that kids today are burnt out, lack belonging, and many feel safest in their rooms or on their phones.

As adults, many of us have fond childhood memories of going outside, riding bikes, and playing pick-up games with other kids in our neighborhoods. This is a stark contrast to today, where many kids' ideal hang-out is quietly sitting together in the same room on their own phones.

This truly begs the question - what exactly are they doing on their phones all day? At least for our youth, we find they're texting their parents and friends, streaming shows and sports games, and - most surprisingly - many are playing online chess. Another way they're allocating their screen time is consuming short-form video content on TikTok and Instagram and meeting their digital neighbors.

In the early days of human civilization, our conception of humanity was confined to our villages - we weren't privy to the issues happening across the globe like we are today. Later in the 1990's, British Anthropologist Robin Dunbar asserted that as human beings, we can only comfortably sustain 150 relationships. In today's digital landscape, our youth could take in personal information about 150 new people from all over the planet in an afternoon. They offer support and feedback in the comments and occasionally feel a deep level of empathy for their digital neighbors. They see problems in the world they'd like to solve. They are only human - and we wonder why they're so burnt out.

As a Church, we can offer fellowship as an alternative to scrolling - putting down their phones and picking up a service project, as many of our youth did this summer on RISE. And from our youth, we can all learn to be more empathetic and kind to our digital and IRL (in real life) neighbors.







# A GOOD NEIGHBOR

# WE ARE CHRIST'S HANDS AND FEET

On October 29, 2012, Superstorm Sandy devastated the East Coast and took a tremendous toll on New Jersey. Though we experienced the winds and lost power in the Morristown area, we knew that the Jersey shore was hit by the storm in far more disastrous ways.

In February of 2013, a PCM task force went down to observe the destruction all along the shore. At the end of the day, we decided that the need in the Union Beach area was huge and we could work with a church, Gateway Church of Christ, which had been on the scene since the day after the storm hit. We immediately started sending volunteers down to Union Beach to work wherever needed. We also raised funds to send for supplies. In PCM's Charter for Sandy Relief, we stated that, "This effort is expected to provide long-term support of the Sandy recovery effort."

And so our work continued for almost four more years. Many from the PCM family (adults and children alike!) participated in the efforts to bring relief and hope to so many people. Read on about how our help impacted one woman from a letter we received recently:

#### A LETTER FROM BONNIE

My name is Bonnie Browne and I live in Ocean Beach (Lavallette). It's been more than ten years since Hurricane Sandy impacted my life.

A group from your church came to help during recovery from the storm. I have the note and card they brought framed in a place where I see it everyday and I say a prayer of gratitude.

At that time, I was 61, living alone, overwhelmed with the enormity of the impact from the storm is an understatement. Barely mentally and emotionally able to deal, I did not have the physical capability often needed.

The help clearing weeds and throwing out and repairs were the least of what the group provided. Someone cared and I was not alone. Helped me remember, we are never alone, God sent me your angels.

Well, as it turns out, the house, structurally unsound was demolished and I was blessed to receive the grant to assist with finances and get a brand spanking new house. There were glitches, I moved nine times in the four years it took for me finally move HOME November 2016.

Now, much belatedly I thank you. I imagine it is a new generation of your congregation that goes out now to serve those in need. Please know how much it is appreciated and that I never gave up trying.

I hope whoever drew the card is still in the church and might recognize it to know how special and what it has meant to me.

# HELPING CHILDREN IN NEED

The Outreach Committee of PCM is responsible for directing church funds toward groups that respond to the teachings of Jesus, which are, in short, to love and care for one another. One of the Committee's focal points is to support organizations that help children in need.

It was Jesus himself who said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." (Matthew 19:14).

Some of the programs PCM supports benefit children and adults, like those that address Food Insecurity. But there are other programs directed just to children, and they serve different populations in different ways.

PCM's Outreach Committee, and all PCM members, should be proud of our long-standing connection to these organizations. Our support is making a difference to our community, and to our commitment as a church to live out the words to "love one another."



#### THE MORRIS/SUSSEX CASA PROGRAM

The Morris/Sussex CASA Program (which stands for Court Appointed Special Advocates) relies on community volunteers who stand up in court and speak out for abused and neglected children. The Morris/Sussex CASA is the only court-authorized advocacy program for children and youth in foster care in these counties.

Our local CASA is part of a national program serving 950 communities. Volunteers are selected and trained in a rigorous process, and they are a key part of the one-on-one mentoring and counseling these children need.

The organization also requires funding to support the children and teens. With the help of PCM donations – and those from many other people and local organizations – CASA can provide essential items not covered by DCPP to the youth and families we serve. These items, often needed on an emergent basis, include prepaid cell phones, school devices (laptops/iPads), clothes for job interviews, proms, and special events, college prep materials and fees (SAT review manuals/courses/application fees), school items (books, calculators, backpacks), sports equipment, and art, dance, music, and sports lessons for youth to explore and enhance their talents. Most importantly, CASA pays for educational tutoring, summer camp and other experiences to help children and youth in foster care to overcome their trauma and enjoy childhood.

# HELPING CHILDREN IN NEED



#### CHILDREN ON THE GREEN

Children on the Green is the nursery school located in the Morristown Methodist Church, right around the corner from PCM's Sanctuary. Children on the Green is a licensed, non-profit childcare center committed to quality, developmentally appropriate care and early

education for children of families living or working in the Morristown area. The leaders of the school seek to reflect the diversity of the community and are committed to partnerships that support all children and families.

Children on the Green (COG) opened in 1994, with the philosophy that every child deserves access to a quality early education program regardless of their means. Contributions from PCM and others offer scholarships for children with demonstrated need, providing them with access to quality education and developmental opportunities unavailable to them in other centers. COG is the only childcare center in New Jersey that provides full scholarships to children referred to them by local homeless and battered women's shelters.

#### **CORNERSTONE FAMILY PROGRAMS**

Over two centuries ago, women from the Presbyterian Church in Morristown joined with others in town to establish Cornerstone Family Programs, a charity to help local women and children with necessities such as food, clothing, and fuel. Though it has had several different names since 1813, the organization has always strived to transform their programs to anticipate and address the evolving needs of individuals and families in Morristown and vicinity. In 2013, Cornerstone merged with the Morristown Neighborhood House to offer a broad array of programs including childcare, healthcare, cultural and recreational activities, and an advocacy for social justice on behalf of the community.

Today, Cornerstone operates day-care, after-school care, and enrichment classes for preschoolers through elementary school age children. The Outreach Committee is most impressed with the array of services offered to teens, including help with tutoring and college admissions, and supervised recreational and cultural activities that help young people find the best in themselves.

The name Cornerstone Family Program is more appropriate than ever, as the center also provides guidance to parents as they, and their children, grow and change. Cornerstone also works with senior citizens, adult caregivers, and veterans who may need assistance.

# FROM THE PCM SAFETY MINISTRY TEAM

The Safety Ministry Team hopes you had a wonderful summer!

With the start of a new church program year, we would like to remind you of one of the security measures in place to better assure the safety of our church community.

The Avigilon Alta Open system electronically controls access to the Parish House, Howard House, and Mutch Hall and the Sacristy at the Church on the Green. We have been using it at PCM since 2019.



Originally named OpenPath, Alta Open is an application that resides on your cell phone. It functions as an 'electronic door key', allowing you to unlock a door wirelessly by (1) opening the app on your phone to list the doors to which you have access, and (2) pressing the button next to the name of the door you wish to enter. (Bluetooth must be enabled on your phone when using the app.)

The extent of your access (i.e., specific entrances and timeframes) is set by the systems administrator (a PCM staff member) who can modify it going forward as needed. Those who need temporary access to our facilities (e.g., a contracted soloist attending choir practices, a vendor doing off-hours work, etc.) can be provided the Alta Open app with access limited to the timeframe required.

All members who regularly participate in scheduled activities at the Parish House or Church on the Green (outside of regular worship) should utilize the Alta Open application for building access.

The Avigilon Alta Open app can be downloaded from the Apple App Store (if you have an iPhone) or Google Play (if you have an Android phone). Once downloaded, you can request building access by sending an email to <a href="mailto:office@pcmorristown.org">office@pcmorristown.org</a>. Please include your specific requirements (e.g., activities, location, days, and times) for consideration.

Using the Alta Open app is an important 'best practice' in maintaining secure church facilities. Complementing this are best practices to not leave doors propped open or unlocked (unless they are attended), and to not provide building access to someone you do not know.


### WHAT IS PER CAPITA?

Per Capita financially supports the higher church councils: our presbytery (Presbytery of the Highlands), our synod (Northeast), and the PC(USA). These levels of connectivity are one of the things that make Presbyterianism unique. In a sense, per capita provides the glue that holds the Presbyterian Church together.



#### WHAT DOES MY PER CAPITA SUPPORT?

The breakdown is as follows: the General Assembly portion is \$9.85, the Synod portion is \$4.25, and the Presbytery portion is \$28.50. Camp Johnsonburg – Each year, over thirty youth from our church attend events at Camp Johnsonburg. All the Presbyteries of New Jersey own the J-burg Camp and Conference Center and Per Capita helps operate it. Disaster Relief – When there is a disaster, the Presbyterian Church is one of the first groups to arrive with assistance. The structure that delivers the support comes from Per Capita paid by all Presbyterians.
