Running away is rampant... separation is stylish: separation from mates, from friends, from self. Run and tranquilize, don't talk about it. avoid. Run away and join the army of those who have already run away. When are we going to learn that Christmas Peace comes only when we turn and face the darkness? Only then will we be able to see

Friends, if you're seeking more light in your life right now, then PCM might be the right place to seek it. I hope you'll join us each Sunday during this season. And maybe even consider inviting someone you know to join us on the Advent journey.

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT: HOPE

Rev. Audrey Webber | Luke 21:25-36

What does hope look like when everything around us seems to be crashing down? As many psychologists have written about, we often confuse hope with optimism. We sometimes think of hope as looking on the bright side of things, thinking we will only have the best outcomes in all experiences. In reality, hope is much deeper and more meaningful than a "looking at the world through rose-colored glasses" mentality.

Hope looks a lot more like justice - a change in how we view the world. Hope is a mentality, not necessarily something we feel. Hope can look like community and finding a place in it. Hope looks like our Grief Support Group - making connections with each other on our journeys of grief. As we always say in this group, our journeys all look different, and no two grief journeys look the same. Still, we can hold each other up and offer even in the midst of complete disorientation as found in our Scripture passage - this cosmic movement - that we still know that Jesus' "words will never pass away." God is still there with us. We can hold onto God, hold onto each other, and rely on our community when life gets hard. I often say at the end of prayers when I am praying with so many of you: May you, God, be the last thing on our minds as we go to bed tonight, and the first thing when we wake up in the morning." It is in this that we can find our hope. We are never deserted. We are always found.

This Advent, may we at PCM embody the hope of Christ's coming, finding strength in hope, our care for each other, and leaning into the fact that God is still there today, tomorrow, and always.

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT: PEACE

During Advent, a season of preparation, it is so easy to become completely overwhelmed by just that – preparations! The hustle and bustle of buying gifts, decorating a tree, hanging lights, and preparing for guests on top of our busy schedules can be overwhelming; however, I'd like to invite you to take a moment to meditate on the theme of the second week of Advent, peace. How can we possibly feel at peace in the midst of the chaos?

As a musician, I often listen and reflect on two hymns. Hymn #124, "Still, Still, Still," a simple Austrian carol, describes the peace of the newborn baby Jesus as his mother sings him to sleep. Just as Mary and the Angels watched over Jesus at his birth, so does God watch over us every day; however, in order to hear him, we have to take a moment and listen!

Hymn #347, "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence" is a lesser-known Advent carol, one of the earliest Christian hymns still in use (~275AD). While often construed as a song for Lent, given its dark and modal tune, the text reminds us, again, that to find peace, we must listen – "Let all mortal flesh keep silence... ponder nothing earthly minded, for, with blessing in His hand, Christ our God to earth descendeth."

While for many people Advent is a build up to the excitement of Christmas, I invite you ponder Advent's original meaning – yes, a time of preparation, but also of wonder, prophecy, and the mystery of faith. How are you practicing "peace" and preparing for the Lord's coming? A long time ago, a mentor said to me, "there are 96 15-minute periods in a day." I invite you to take just one of those periods (1.04%) to listen, to find this sense of peace. Even if through His grace you may have already been given this peace, perhaps you can find a way to share it with someone who needs it!

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT:

Alexandra Mead | Luke 3:7-18

Joy and Love go hand in hand here at PCM.

We feel joy because we know God's love for us. In Romans 15:13 we are told, "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." Wow! What an amazing blessing Paul gives us. The Advent season sparks Joy in the hearts of our children as they anticipate the coming of Christmas. Hearing the story of Jesus' birth, the lights, decorations, Christmas crafts, and joyous songs from our choir help to build the anticipation. Our children feel joy making secret gifts for their parents in Sunday school and midweek and as they practice the songs they will sing on Christmas Eve. The children look forward to dressing up as sheep and angels and shepherds for our Christmas pageant.

When asked where I have witnessed a sense of joy at PCM, my answer is truly, everywhere we gather with our children and youth. This church is a second home to so many of our children. They are comfortable in our buildings, they run, they sing, they greet each other with smiles and hugs. They come back to visit after they have graduated. They have learned through our Bible stories that God loves them beyond measure and understanding, that Jesus walks with them through this life.

The story of Advent tells us that when Mary goes to visit her cousin Elizabeth, they both felt great joy. That wonderful feeling of love and joy is the Holy Spirit. When God is present with us through the Holy Spirit, we are filled with Joy. Mary and Elizabeth show us that when we are with people we love, God is there too!

May this season of Advent remind you to pause and thank God for His love and the joy in your life.



Thank you to all who participated, supported, and attended David Baskeyfield's special improvised accompaniment of the 1925 film, The Phantom of the Opera. We welcomed almost 200 audience members into our beautiful sanctuary, of which half were not members! It was such a joy to invite our neighbors inside this sacred space.

With the season of Advent upon us, I hope you can join us for a myriad of special musical events in celebration of the birth of Jesus. On **Saturday, December 7 at 7:30 pm** and **Sunday, December 8 at 3:00 pm**, we will host the **Harmonium Choral Society** in our sanctuary for their concert entitled, "Snow Angel." This concert, featuring choir, orchestra, piano, and organ, is designed for us to "experience rebirth and beauty through the eyes of children, under the watchful gaze of angels." The concerts are structured around Sarah Quartel's evocative "Snow Angel," for chorus, cello, and djembe. Additionally, this concert will serve as the East Coast premier of Joe Gregorio's "Unbound Angels," as well as gems by Bruckner, Buxtehude, Hailstork, and Rossi. Tickets are available for purchase online.

On the very same weekend, **December 8**, we will also be featuring **Antonio Vivaldi's "Gloria in D major"** during our **Sunday morning worship service!** Vivaldi's composition serves as a set of liturgical movements, designed to replace many of the common prayers and liturgies of the worship service. The Chancel Choir has been hard at work preparing, and we will be joined by a 14-piece orchestra in the Chancel. We hope you will join us for this special music, as we sing the Advent text, "Glory be to God on high, and on earth peace to all!"

On **Saturday, December 21 at 7:30 pm**, **Imperial Brass** will present "**A Christmas Festival,**" a concert featuring Imperial Brass alongside Sola Voce, a choral group from the New Jersey Youth Chorus. Performing now for over 30 years, Imperial Brass presents entertaining programs including traditional brass band literature, classical arrangements, popular music, and more. Tickets are available for purchase online.

Finally, I would invite you to join us on **Christmas Eve for our 4:00 pm and 8:00 pm** offerings. The 4:00 pm service will feature children of the church in a special presentation, designed for families with young children. The 8:00 pm will be supported by our Ringers on the Green handbell choir, the Chancel Ringers, the Chancel Choir, and string orchestra.

What a month we have ahead of us! As always, I want to express my heartfelt thanks for the wonderful welcome you have extended to me, as your new Director of Music Ministries. I hope you can join us for this season of preparation for the coming of our Lord.

NO ROOM AT THE INN: PCM ADDRESSES HOUSING NEEDS

As we head into Advent and the story of Jesus' birth, we recall that in Luke 2:7, the Bible states that Mary and Joseph placed their newborn, Jesus, in a manger in a stable because there was no room for them at the inn. A young couple - he a carpenter, she a new mother - can't find shelter. It is a touching image, and one that resonates even today.

In Morris County alone, nearly 475 people experienced homelessness in 2023, the most recently published count. Government agencies estimate that this number is only one quarter to one half of the true total. In wealthy Morris County, we have "only" 5% of the total of unhoused people in New Jersey. For them, "no room at the inn" is a constant reality. The Morristown Housing Authority, which is our local agency charged with providing housing for those with lower incomes, is filled to capacity and so sends homeless families to live in nearby motels. Ironically, there is some room at the inn, but none in regular housing. Living in a "shelter rate motel" can be sad, scary and dangerous, but because of the scarcity of decent housing, stays at these motels are getting longer for displaced families.

Prices for housing continue to soar, and new construction that would be affordable to a carpenter and a stay-at-home mother is vanishingly rare. The Outreach Committee of PCM has made housing one of their priorities of concern, along with addressing Food Insecurity and Child Development.

Homeless Solutions, Inc., founded at the Presbyterian Church in Morristown 41 years ago, is one of our partners in trying to help the unhoused. Homeless Solutions (HSI) has a motto: "A Hand Up, Not a Hand Out" and this informs their work. They run the largest shelter in Morris County serving on average 80 individuals/families in addition to a winter warming center in their facility on Hanover Avenue in Morris Plains, where they can house people overnight and provide a healthy dinner. But the real work is to help homeless people gain the life skills they need to be able to hold down a job, find their own housing, and care for their families in a way that will help make sure they do not return to homelessness.

This is difficult work, involving mental counselling and physical healthcare, providing supervised Transitional Housing for those undergoing the rigorous 18-month program leading to housing in the larger community, and building and maintaining high-quality housing intended for low-income recipients. Our church's gifts to HSI are a small part of the now-large organization's overall budget, but our connections run deep.

NO ROOM AT THE INN: CONTINUED

Church members are always welcome to sign up for a tour of the facility, or to volunteer to cook a meal there, or provide a birthday party for a child staying at the Shelter or in Transitional Housing. Please read much more about Homeless Solutions on their website: homeless solutions.org.

The other partner in addressing homeless in our area is Family Promise of Morris County, one of 200+ nationwide affiliates of Family Promise, Inc, founded in New Jersey in 1986. Their work is about "transforming the lives of families and individuals... through all stages of life to prevent or end homelessness and housing insecurity." Since its beginnings, Family Promise of Morris County has expanded from a single Shelter program to offering many different programs. Encompassing the areas of Shelter, Rapid Rehousing & Diversion, Housing, and Outreach, their programs have transformed to best support both families and individuals.

The Outreach Committee of PCM particularly supports the Family Promise program called "Our Promise Drop-In & Resource Center" (OP). It is located right in Morristown at the Baptist Church on Washington Street (across from the Courthouse). The Drop-in Center serves the needs of the chronically and transient homeless, veterans, those exiting from jails and hospitals, youth, LGBTQ+, and those who are precariously housed. The following services are provided: phone and computer access, mailing address, restrooms, warming / cooling center, information and referral, linkage to medical, mental health and dental services, case management, systems advocacy and more. It is so important for people scrambling to "get on their feet" to have access to these things so they can begin to find a job, or contact family and friends, and even to have health screening and immunizations. Both partners help fulfill the directions Jesus gave in Matthew 25:35:

For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger, and you invited me in...

There is no single solution to homelessness, but it is important that the church recognize its responsibility to help those who are affected. If there is someday room at the inn for all, it will only be because all of us helped to make it so.
