MARCH 5 | GENESIS 28:10-17 | REV. DANIEL VIGILANTE

Some people have a gift for remembering their dreams. I consider them lucky because I've never been one of them. In this story from Genesis, we read about Jacob, who encountered God in a dream in which he saw a stairway extending from earth to heaven. He heard the voice of God telling him that the land on which he was sleeping was holy - and that God was with him in that place.

I've never been lucky enough to remember most of my dreams, but I have been blessed to experience God's presence at many different times and in countless varied ways. In fact, as I reflect upon it now - rarely have I experienced a sense of God's presence in dreams - but it's almost always been through people. When I have moved to new places, church members have welcomed me and made me feel at home. When I have struggled to make sense of this world that often feels so cruel, I have seen God at work in the kindness of others. When my father passed away, a simple text from a friend reminded me that even in my grief, I was not alone.

God's presence is made known in dreams but more often through the love of people. Which makes me wonder - how are you being called to make God known through this season of Lent?

MARCH 6 | EXODUS 33:12-23 | PATTY SCADUTO

When considering what has changed my faith at this point in time, several thoughts come to mind.

I was raised, along with my four siblings, in a Catholic household. My parents were very devoted Catholics and were determined that all five of us children have a Catholic education. There was much sacrifice on their part so that not only we could attend Catholic schools but that we become faithful followers of the church. During those years, I had no reason to doubt the age-old teachings and rituals of the Catholic church.


As I grew older, I became disillusioned with aspects of my faith. It was during my career as a physician that I had the privilege of meeting many wonderful patients and fellow healthcare workers. Two of those extraordinary people are my good friend Pat and my loving husband, Phil. Pat guided me toward a loving God by introducing to me various teachings of well known theologians. Through those readings, I have come to realize that God is love and God is hope.

Phil, having traveled a similar religious journey, encouraged me to join PCM, knowing that the PCM community has the road map I need to continue my faith journey. PCM's inclusive environment, community outreach, and emphasis on peace and justice are the guide posts that I need at this time in my life to live my faith.

HOMELESS CONNECT MORRISTOWN

On January 31, 116 people streamed in and out of St. Peter's Episcopal Church to receive useful information from 40 agencies and enjoy food and the opportunity to shop for needed clothing – all for free. In addition, 35 haircuts were given by two employees of Razorz Edge Barber Shop. The atmosphere was warm, hospitable, helpful and friendly.

This was the second year that St. Peter's hosted the event which is an outreach to the Morris County unhoused population on the statewide "countday". It is sponsored by the Mental Health Association of Essex and Morris Inc. There were 40 volunteers who assisted in addition to those who represented the various agencies. Among the volunteers were PCM members, Donna Ehle, Kathy Banfe, Leanne Rea, Tom Tignor and Marnie Kaller. Recipients and volunteers enjoyed the opportunity to meet and interact with those who live in and around Morristown.









WE LOVE OUR COHOME NEIGHBORS!

Cohome is a Morristown not-for-profit organization dedicated to creating opportunities for adults with disabilities to access the least restrictive environment that can meet their individual needs. The residents at Cohome recently made the poster below, thanking PCM for our financial and community support. They regularly help us prepare Breakfast Bags for nourish.NJ and have made Christmas cards for our friends at Spring Hills.

REACH OUT AROUND THE GLOBE

The Outreach Committee's partners are currently heavily weighted toward local organizations that help address food insecurity, affordable housing, emergency shelter, and children's development. But Outreach also extends beyond our county, state, and nation.

Since the 19th century, the Presbyterian Church in the United States has been interested in "missionary work" overseas, and the Presbyterian Church in Morristown was no exception. It particularly fell to women's organizations within the church to raise money for support of missionaries, often in Africa or East Asia. Since the mid-20th century, the work of converting people to Christianity has been transformed into physical development work shared by many secular and religious-based organizations. Establishment of medical facilities, creation of water and sanitation systems, and education and training for children and adults has become the modern "overseas mission" in poor and underdeveloped places.

FOUNDATION FOR PEACE

The Presbyterian Church in Morristown currently has one direct partner in international work, Foundation for Peace. Founded by a pediatrician, Dr. Kenneth Culver, FFP currently works mostly in Kenya, Haiti, and the Dominican Republic. The organization is remarkable in that its leadership are all volunteers, and it relies on American volunteers to help build housing and water systems and provide routine medical care. About 98% of the funds FFP receives go directly to projects in partner countries, to the benefit of people there. Foundation for Peace also partners with other local organizations on the ground in the countries they serve to distribute food and offer educational opportunities. PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE

Having trusted connections "on the ground" is indeed one of the key elements of successful mission work outside the United States. The PCM Outreach Committee has encouraged our congregation to donate funds for sustained responses to natural disasters, and typically this is directed to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. This is a subset of the larger Presbyterian Church's mission and outreach programs and works through local partners in areas of need. For more information, visit pcusa.org/pda.

Beyond natural disasters, which seem to be more frequent and more malignant each year, the Presbyterian Church USA, offers long-term project-based work with international partners to bring hope and healing to the most vulnerable. PCUSA's work in developing people and physical resources is important in meeting Jesus' directive to "go out into the world" with the Gospel and the service that honor our Christian beliefs. THE POWER OF HELLO

From the Safety Ministry Team

The Safety Ministry Team is always considering how to best assure our friendly and welcoming church community remains safe and secure.

We would like to introduce you to 'The Power of Hello', an approach to security that is based on utilizing friendly conversation to identify and address potential problems. Members of our team were introduced to it at a security seminar sponsored by the Presbytery. We felt it could easily be applied here at PCM and included it in the orientation of our Welcome Team last September.

There are four steps to 'The Power of Hello':

- 1. The first is to **Observe Behavior** -to be aware of individuals or situations that appear out of the ordinary. For example, this could be someone behaving suspiciously, someone who might be in a location where they shouldn't be, or someone wearing attire or carrying something that might conceal a weapon. Or perhaps someone who simply appears lost and needs direction.
- 2. The second and key step of this process is to **Initiate a Hello** to ask if they need assistance (*Hello. Can I help you?*). If someone is not responding try to engage them further by asking, for example, *How are you today? It's good to see you. Is this your first time here? or Are you looking for someone in particular?* If you feel something is not right or are concerned in any way, let someone in charge know. This can be the Welcome Team Leader during worship (who is in the Narthex throughout the service) or one of the staff at the Parish House.
- 3. The third step is to Navigate the Risk the person advised of a concern should observe and assess the situation to determine if action needs to be taken. Does the individual appear to need assistance? Should a Pastor or Stephen Minister be asked to speak with them? Is there something concerning about the individual that poses a threat to others? Is there a potential for danger? Determine if there is a need for further action or whether continued observation is sufficient.
- 4. The fourth step is to **Obtain Help** if it is determined there is a need for further action. If the person is behaving in a manner that is threatening to themself or to others, the police (911) should be called immediately. In worship, if someone acts up or appears upset but is **not** threatening, attempts will be made to bring that person back to the Narthex where a Pastor or Stephen Minister can speak with them.

'The Power of Hello' is an approach that you can apply in a variety of situations. If you would like additional information or have any questions, please feel free to speak with a member of our team.
